Class Description: Omnibus VI focuses on great works beginning just after the Reformation and covers significant works of modern Western culture. Because this course covers theology, history, and literature, it can be expected that the weekly workload will consist of 10-12 hours per week.

Grades/Ages: This class is designed for students in the 10th, 11th, and 12th grades.

Responsibilities

- Parent Responsibility: To establish and oversee an educational plan for the student. And, to grade and review the progress of the student. In the Grammar stage this is a daily activity for each subject. In the Logic and Rhetoric stages this can become a weekly activity.
- Student Responsibility: To actively engage with the teaching and study work. To respect the instructions and expectations of Dad and Mom. And, to come prepared to each CO-OP class.
- **Teacher-Tutor Responsibility:** To support (bolster) the educational plan of the parent. To offer passionate and accurate teaching/tutoring of the subject matter. And, to challenge the student in the subject.

Grading Rubric: As a reminder, although the teacher-tutor will provide each student/parent with a midsemester progress report and an end of semester progress report, it is the responsibility of the student's parents to determine the final grade for the student. The progress report provided by the teacher-tutor is meant to be a reflection of the work accomplished within the scope of the class and therefore NOT a reflection of the student's overall progress.

• Attendance & Participation:

10 %

Students will also be expected to attend and engage with the class discussion.

• Reading Log:

10 %

A log that records books read (including completion date and total reading time). [example: *Death on the Nile* - Completed Aug. $29^{th} - 8$ Hours]

• Poem:

30 %

These works can be silly, serious, thoughtful, whimsical, and grammatically weak. However, they should reflect upon the readings for each week.

All students will also need to compile the entire year's poems into a single booklet. Due the final week of class.

• Paper:

30 %

A 1-2-page paper that answers one of the *suma questions* or is a response paper to the weekly reading synthesizing. The format should follow a common format style.

• Rhetoric:

20 %

Each week the students will read aloud their poems and papers (with occasional surprises along the way). The students will also be expected to act at a Master/Mistress of Ceremonies (MC) at the Fall and Spring Music Recitals.

• SENIOR PROJECT (For Seniors ONLY)

REQUIRED

All seniors will need to complete a paper entitled, *How My Education Has Helped Form Me into The Man/Woman That I Want to Be*. This will be a 4–5-page paper. The paper should follow a common format style and demonstrate a comprehensive reflection on the student's own educational experience and life goals. Due the final week of Class.

Classroom Behavior/Etiquette (Code of Conduct)
